504 ACCOMMODATION PLAN	A plan which outlines reasonable accommodations to allow an inmate who has a disability to participate in any of the education programs as required by the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, Section 504 (PL. 93-112).	DO 910
ABSOLUTE DISCHARGE	Date of Offense prior to January 1, 1994. Pursuant to A.R.S. §31-411, a discharge from Parole granted by the ABOEC or a discharge from the custody of the Department upon completion of the sentence imposed. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Pursuant to A.R.S. §31-414, a discharge from imprisonment granted by the ABOEC. ABUSE OF PRESCRIPTION MEDICATION	A current or past pattern of abuse of prescription medication is considered the following: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The applicant has used prescription medications not prescribed to them, in any combination, which exceeds six times in any 12-month period since the age of 21. • The applicant has utilized a medication in an attempt to alter their consciousness. • The applicant has frequented multiple physicians to obtain numerous prescriptions of the same medication. ACCESS TO THE COURTS	Inmates shall not be barred from the courts and the Department shall, when written requests are made, actively assist inmates in the preparation and initial filing of (1) direct appeals from the convictions for which they were incarcerated, (2) Habeas petitions, (3) '1983 Civil Rights actions, and (4) Conditions of Confinement actions. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Active Assistance - Assistance provided to inmates by Paralegals. • Passive Assistance - Assistance available to inmates through resource materials to which they are directed. ACCIDENT	An occurrence involving a commercial motor vehicle (CMV) operating on a public road which results in a fatality or the CDL driver receives a citation under state or local law for a moving traffic violation arising from the accident.	DO 408
ACCOUNTABILITY AND MOVEMENT OFFICER	The staff member responsible for clearing the inmates counted against the various ACIS count sheet reports.	DO 701
ACCOUNTABILITY LINE	The line that shows who signed the letter/document, who authored the letter/document and who typed it.	DO 103
ACCREDITED MINISTER/RELIGIOUS LEADER	An individual representative of a religious group who visits an inmate and is approved to visit by the senior chaplain/chaplain.	DO 904
ACQUIRED IMMUNE DEFICIENCY SYNDROME (AIDS)	A human disease characterized by a collapse of the body's natural immunity against disease. Because of this failure of the immune system, patients with AIDS are highly vulnerable to one or more unusual infections or cancers which usually do not pose a threat to anyone whose immune system is functioning normally. AIDS diagnosis is made when the person is HIV positive and has had an AIDS-related disease.	DO 1102
ACTIVE PERSONAL CEREMONIES	The inmate is present in his/her personal area, performing religious activity; not otherwise engaged in daily routine activities.	DO 904
ADCNET	A Web-based tool providing internal Department Information to networked employees. A closed system that cannot be accessed by the public.	DO 101
ADCRR CONTRACT MONITOR	An ADCRR employee who reports to the Healthcare Services Division and is tasked with ensuring compliance with the Healthcare Services contract. May also be referred to as ADCRR Complex Compliance Monitor.	DO 117
ADEQUACY OF PROOF	For the purpose of this Department Order, the adequacy or standard of proof is whether the trier of fact (Disciplinary Hearing Officer) is persuaded by the evidence that it is more probably true than not the inmate committed the disciplinary violation.	DO 803
ADJUST	For the purpose of the Department Order, means to review, depreciate as required, forward depreciated and/or adjusted claims to ADOA Risk Management, or to make payment from a Department Revolving Fund for claims under the adjusted value.	DO 909

ADMINISTRATIVE DISCHARGE	Action initiated by staff to discharge an inmate from a program for reasons not within an inmate's control. May result from a change in an inmate's schedule, unavailability due to medical issues, out-to-court status, etc.	DO 910
ADMINISTRATIVE REFUSAL	Decision by an inmate, through word or action, to not participate in a program that is offered or assigned. Also applies when an inmate chooses to withdraw from or quit a program being attended.	DO 910
ADMINISTRATIVE REMOVAL	Action initiated by staff for an inmate's misbehavior, disruption, or failure to actively participate in the program. Includes an inmate's unavailability due to disciplinary action (i.e., assignment to lock up).	DO 910
ADULTERATED SPECIMEN	A specimen which has been altered or a substitute provided by prospective employees, volunteer applicants, employees and volunteers to be submitted as a specimen to be drug tested, and may include the use of a masking agent to prevent the detection of drug use in the testing sample. AFFIDAVIT	A written or printed declaration or statement of facts, made voluntarily, and confirmed by the oath or affirmation of the party making it, and signed in the presence of a Notary Public. For example, affidavits are completed by Peace Officers to obtain search warrants.	DO 107
AGENTS OF AN ATTORNEY	<p>Individuals who are authorized by a licensed attorney to act on behalf of, for or in place of the attorney, and who are directed to visit an inmate on behalf of, or in place of an attorney.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • To demonstrate a bonafide agency relationship with an attorney, pursuant to this Order, an individual shall have documented (written) authorization by the attorney to act on behalf of, for or in place of the attorney. The written authorization, signed and dated by the attorney shall: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Expressly set forth the specific nature of the duty or duties in accordance with which the agent purports to act on behalf of, for or in place of the attorney. • Outline the general nature of the visit. • Be notarized. • Agents may include private investigators, licensed in accordance with A.R.S. §32-2401; Paralegals; law students; secretarial staff and duly appointed process servers. • Agents shall not include anyone who is on an inmate's visiting list. AGGRAVATING/ MITIGATING CIRCUMSTANCES	Circumstances or issues that may justify a lesser or greater discipline for violation of a particular offense, which the approving authority may consider before recommending corrective discipline. Examples may include: admission of complicity, remorse, commitment to appropriate subsequent behavior, repeated violations, refusal to commit to change, and damage to the Department's image.	DO 601
AIRCRAFT/UAV INTRUSION	Any entry of institutional airspace by an unidentified aircraft/UAV without the Department's knowledge or authorization.	DO 714

ALCOHOL	Intoxicating agent in beverage alcohol, ethyl alcohol or other low molecular weight alcohols including methyl and isopropyl alcohol and may include any medication containing alcohol.	DO 408 DO 522
ALCOHOL ABUSE TREATMENT FUND (AATF)	The Department's account for money that accrues from work performed by persons convicted for driving while intoxicated or driving under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs. Funds from this account are used to provide alcohol/substance abuse treatment for inmates incarcerated for Driving Under the Influence (DUI) offenses.	DO 905
ALCOHOL USE	The consumption of any beverage, mixture, or preparation, including any medication containing alcohol.	DO 408
AIRBORNE PRECAUTIONS	Safety precautions to prevent the transmission of infectious agents that remain infectious over long distances when suspended in the air (e.g., tuberculosis).	DO 1102
ALIGNMENT	Alignments can occur for various reasons: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • To correct a minor inaccuracy such as a typographical or punctuation error, a pagination fault, or grammar issue contained in a written instruction. • Corrections made when updating organization structure, such as changing a title or proper name. • A change made by the Office of Primary Responsibility (OPR) that when reviewed by an Assistant Director, Chief of Staff or Deputy Director does not require a full Executive level review. Alignments require no further review and may occur without the Director's signature.	DO 101
ALPHA/COLOR DOT SYSTEM	An identification system involving all institution and unit locks and keys being labeled with a letter of the alphabet and a color code. The designated color code is consistent for all prison buildings and is determined by the function of the building. The appropriate key for a lock is easily identified by comparing the alpha and color code of the key to the alpha and color code of the lock.	DO 702

AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT (ADA) DIVISION LIAISON	An employee who is appointed by the Assistant Director or designee to be responsible for coordinating ADA activities within the Division or area.	DO 108
AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT (ADA) INSTITUTION LIAISON	A Deputy Warden or Associate Deputy Warden who is appointed by Warden that will be responsible for coordinating ADA activities within the institution.	DO 108
AMMUNITION INVENTORIES	Operational Inventory - Service ammunition and chemical agents that are used or issued during the daily operations of each armory and may be inventoried accurately in a minimum amount of time. Training Inventory - Bulk ammunition, reloads and/or wadcutters used for training or re-qualification.	DO 716

	Reserve/Back up Inventory - Service ammunition in a greater quantity than required for daily operations. Reserve ammunition shall be kept in locked storage and secured with a numbered security seal.	
ANATOMICAL GIFT	A donation of all or part of a human body to take effect after the donor's death for the purpose of transplantation, therapy, research or education. A.R.S. §36-841(3)	DO 922
ANNUAL AGENCY TRACKING NUMBERS	A system of annually tracking liability loss claims internally and cross-referencing ADOA claim numbers once submitted and assigned.	DO 909
ANNUAL IN-SERVICE TRAINING PLAN	A state-wide comprehensive plan approved by the Director which identifies the Core and Elective training requirements covering a period of one training year.	DO 509
ANTERIOR FLIPPER (Dental)	Is a plastic partial replacing one or more missing anterior teeth.	DO 1101
ANTI-FELON IDENTIFICATION (AFID) TAG	Is a small plastic chip imprinted with a code recorded by CEW TASER International for identification purposes. If a CEW TASER is deployed, the AFID tags (20-30 per cartridge) are expelled along with the darts. The AFID tags are disbursed at the scene upon discharge of the CEW TASER, recovered, and traced back to the entity that purchased that cartridge.	DO 1003

APPOINTMENT LIST	A roster prepared daily by Healthcare staff indicating all scheduled inmate appointments for medical, mental and/or dental healthcare.	DO 1101

ARIZONA BOARD OF EXECUTIVE CLEMENCY/ICE DEPORTATION HEARING VISITOR	Any person entering a Department Institution or private prison for the purpose of attending an Arizona Board of Executive Clemency or Immigration and Custom Enforcement Deportation hearing.	DO 202
ARIZONA CORRECTIONAL INFORMATION SYSTEM (ACIS)	A host-based electronic data processing system containing the primary inmate database applications used in inmate management systems.	DO 102 DO 901

The Advisory Board shall meet periodically based on input need, for the purpose of reviewing the business and financial operations of ACI.	DO 115

ARIZONA CORRECTIONAL INDUSTRIES (ACI) CONTRACT PARTNER	A company, agency or organization that has entered into a contract for the purpose of establishing an inmate labor program between the Department and the corporate/governmental entity.	DO 503
ARIZONA CORRECTIONAL INFORMATION SYSTEM (ACIS) COUNT SHEET	An automated listing of all assigned inmates which may be generated by inmate name in alphabetical order, inmates by housing assignment, or inmates by work/program assignment.	DO 701
ARIZONA CORRECTIONAL INFORMATION SYSTEM (ACIS) FACILITY POPULATION REPORT	An electronic report reflecting the capacity, inside count and outside count for all facilities.	DO 701
ARIZONA CRIME INFORMATION CENTER (ACIC)	The Arizona counterpart of NCIC, available for entries and inquiries through the ACJIS network; the common acronym is ACIC. Most ACIC and NCIC files are totally independent.	DO 121

ARIZONA MEDICAL MARIJUANA CARD VERIFICATION WEBSITE	A secure, password-protected web-based system established and maintained by the DHS that is available to law enforcement personnel and nonprofit medical marijuana dispensary agents on a 24 hour basis for verification of registry identification cards. The website will only accept the 20-digit registry identification card number and if valid, will provide the name of the cardholder and when available, the amount of marijuana dispensed in the last 60 days.
